Fleischkuechle fundraiser happening at Hazen Bay

In any town, people love fundraisers where food is involved.

And that will be the case August 2 when, in conjunction with the Buffalo Valley Archers Outdoor Archery Shoot, a fleischkuechle fundraiser will be held at the Hazen Bay Convenience Store from 11 a.m. until 8 p.m. to raise

money to plant trees around Hazen

But that's not all. The archery club will hold a 25-target, 2.5 mile competition amongst the rolling hills at Hazen Bay.

From 6 p.m. until 8 p.m., Jordan Eslinger and Bronson Heid of Northern Light from Beulah will perform their own style of folk music at the Bay. Northern Light performed at the Hazen 'Music in the Park' summer concert series earlier in the summer before bad weather forced stoppage of the show midway through the one-hour set.

"These fundraisers are popular in our area," said organizer Carla Borlaug, co-owner of the Hazen Bay C-Store. "People enjoy them and come out to support the fundraisers people are doing. This fundraiser is to help raise the money to plant trees out at Hazen Bay."

Two years ago, the Borlaugs organized a fleischkuechle fundraiser to raise money for playground equip-

Farm Rescue makes a difference in Hazen

The day was March 28 of this year. Hazen cattle rancher Kenny Forster was riding an all terrain vehicle as he worked on the fences around his ranch.

Without warning, that day became a day Forster will never forget.

With fencing piled on the back of his ATV, Forster inadvertently drove the vehicle off a nine-foot cliff. Trying to step off as soon as he realized his mistake, his foot was caught in either the fencing or some wire and he was unable to get out of harm's way.

The ATV tumbled end-over-end, landing on top of Forster at least twice.

For two hours, he lay there without any help, with 18 broken ribs in the front and back, a broken collarbone and two collapsed lungs. The broken ribs pierced his lungs, causing massive bleeding.

Once help arrived, he was stabilized at Sakakawea Medical Center and airlifted to Bismarck. At the hospital, he was induced into a three-week coma and administered 12 units of blood in the process.

Doctors said his physical conditioning and not being a smoker likely saved his life while he was in the hospital for 48 days.

Fast forward to today. With 250 head of Red Angus cattle to be fed, Forster received the help he needed with his hay crops from Farm Rescue in conjunction with RDO Equipment.

RDO donated the equipment for haying and Farm Rescue provided volunteers to harvest 1,000 bales of hay for the Forster ranch. The haying concluded Monday.

"Farm Rescue really helped me out," said Forster. "They helped me get caught up. They were a godsend. So many volunteers helped me out. They were very helpful and very accommodating. I could have eventually got it done but I would

ment at Hazen Bay and raised nearly \$5,000 dollars for the cause.

"Now that the playgrounds are done, the park is in need of trees out there," said Borlaug. "The park has been there for quite a few years but the older trees are dying and they need to be replaced.

They have added some new campsites and they don't have any trees. They need the trees so campers will have some shade.

In addition to the fundraiser, Hazen Bay collects donations for firewood out at the

popular campground.

'All of the money we raise goes into a fund to pay for whatever project we're working on that year."

Borlaug said she is expecting a big crowd for the archery shoot, not to mention campers in the park and fishermen who will be on the water.

"There will be a lot of extra people out at Hazen Bay we hope will come eat with us," Borlaug said.

Borlaug's husband Steve said he is excited about this year's event.

"It is a good thing for Farm Rescue to help and donate." Just ask Kenny Forster.


