City awaits costs for lift station fix

When it rains it pours and it appears that Washburn may be in for another expense thanks to spring weather related issues. Besides streets and sewage issues the increase in pumping out at the City lift station has put the system on its last leg.

City maintenance superintendent Chad Dahme reported to the city commission during the last regular commission meeting about the lift station and that one motor had failed, two electric panels and rails were in disrepair and the other motor was in poor shape. The lift station was built in 1980.

Since the meeting, Dahme said that they have installed a temporary pump to keep up with the pumping. That is working for now but they have requested information from the city engineer to find out what the cost would be to update the system. Preliminary estimates were in the \$60,000 range to replace both pumps.

North Dakota Sewage has looked at the system and recommended replacing the pumps and panels. Dahme said if the cost is approved to go ahead with new, it would be another six weeks before the parts came in after approval. Dahme hoped to have an estimate back by the end of this week.
